Fall is Fleeting...

Fall is not a date. Fall could never be committed to a calendar or fixed into a schedule. Fall is not for those who plan two weeks ahead or keep rigid datebooks. Fall is when you find yourself spending an entire Saturday afternoon raking every leaf in the yard into pile, only to invite children to dive in and scatter them to the wind. Fall is the evening you reacquaint yourself with the quilt that laid at the foot of your bed all summer. It's the first day you put on your big fluffy sweatshirt or sweater. Or see a falling orange leaf. It's blankets set on cold bleachers under the lights on Friday nights. Autumn is hot drinks and marching bands and lettermen jackets.



In remembering boyhood, I recount the October days when I walked the woods and fields carrying a .22 or small shotgun, hunting with my closest friends. Sporting afield was the foundation on which we built friendships that last till this day. Fall breezes gently blew with the wonderful aroma of leaves burning in the ditch aside the dirt road. Either after school or at the end of a long day of play, my sister and I would visit my grandmother's kitchen.



We could see her baking apple pies through the picture window as we walked up the steps of the farmhouse. The old farmhouse was drafty, but comfortable.

Grandmother's pantry was packed each Autumn. Canned goods from the now frosted garden, apples from the tree in the yard and more. Her old mason jars and freezer bags brimmed full. My grandfather would raise a pig in the barn, and a few fat chickens in the coop. My younger Sister (who I still refer to as "Kid") and I would share a spot at the window where the warm air came up from the wood stove in the cellar, each of us eating a pumpkin cookie or a slab of apple pie, fresh from the stove.

We would watch Grandfather drive the old Allis-Chalmers tractor 'round the cornfields with an old 2-row picker, those yellow ears of corn falling a few at a time from the old picker into a gravity wagon. Those old farmers never broke any speed records with their steady pace as they rolled 'round and 'round the rows of corn. The neighbors would stop by to take a few stalks of corn for decorating the "Club House", a small old building that was used by the community.

Most families looked forward to the harvest party in the old community hall. We gathered in the poorly wired old structure, with the creaky floorboards...kids bobbed for apples in a cattle tub, with little concern for germs and such. They would compete to get the most candy from a bowl filled with flour, leaving each competitor dusted white. Mothers would run the events and hand out treats, punch and goodies. Old men stood to the side, talking of silage, timber prices, and football. And at the end of the night, we'd drive home, eating our goodies under a moon so large, it seemed to dwarf the house.

Fall is a moment that you can't put your finger on. Like smoke off Father Time's pipe in a crisp wind, Autumn is fleeting.

Flu Season Is Right Around The Corner

Flu season is quickly approaching and the best way to protect yourself from this disease is to get your annual flu vaccine. The flu can affect anyone at any age and is responsible for more than 200,000 hospitalizations and 36,000 deaths annually in the United States. Flu outbreaks can occur as early as October and generally peak in January or later.



It is recommended that anyone who wants to decrease their chances of contracting the flu virus should get a seasonal influenza vaccine. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends that certain high-risk groups receive a flu vaccine every year. These high-risk groups include:

- Children aged 6 months up to their 19th birthday
- People 50 years of age and older
- People of any age with certain chronic medical conditions
- Pregnant women
- People living in nursing homes or other long term care facilities
- People who live with or care for those at high risks from complications from the flu

The seasonal influenza vaccine does not protect against the H1N1 virus (swine flu virus). A vaccine to protect against the swine flu is currently in process and could be ready as early as late October. The ACIP is recommending that certain target groups receive the 2009 H1N1 vaccine when it is first available. These groups include:

- Pregnant women
- People who live with or care for children less than 6 months of age
- Healthcare and emergency medical services personnel with direct patient contact
- Children between the ages of 6 months and 4 years old, and
- Children 5 through 18 years of age who have chronic medical conditions

It is important to remember that the flu vaccines consist of inactivated viruses, so you cannot contract the flu from the flu shot. Some minor side effects associated with the vaccines are soreness, redness, or swelling at the injection site, low grade fever, and body aches. It takes approximately 2 weeks after immunization to develop antibodies to protect against the flu.



In addition to vaccinations, we can all help prevent the spread of the flu by taking a few extra steps. Remember to use a tissue to cover your nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing, to wash your hands often with soap and water, and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth as these are easy ways to spread germs.

Budget: Good News to Property Owners

NEWS RELEASE (OCT. 5, 2009) WARREN – While this budget impasse has gone on for far too long, Senate President Pro Tempore Joe Scarnati (R-Jefferson) is pleased that they will be able to get it right, and property owners will end up being the big winners.

“The amount of state and federal dollars that school districts could receive under the 2009/2010 budget proposal currently in front of the legislature is tremendous and should offset the need for any property tax increases in the foreseeable future,” Scarnati stated. “This budget will not only be a win for our children and schools, but a huge win for property owners.”

According to Scarnati, schools in the 25th Senatorial District will receive anywhere from a 6% to a 15.5% increase in their overall subsidies. Pennsylvania has increased funding to our school districts by approximately 31% over the past seven years.

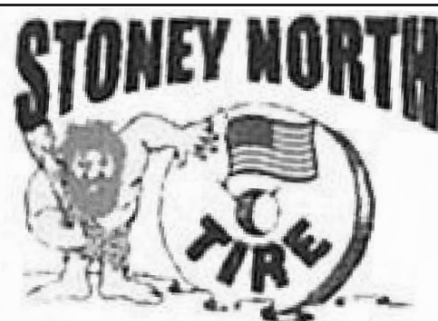
“The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has shown significant support for education while, at the same time, not taking more money out of taxpayers’ paychecks,” Scarnati added. “I am confident that school districts will also be able to strike the same balance with funding educational priorities without raising property taxes.”

Scarnati also mentioned that the significant increase in education funding is the main difference in this proposal from the House Republican proposal. House Republicans have chosen not to be involved in the budget process mainly due to the difference in education funding.

“Of course, given the windfall of support for education in this year’s budget proposal, there should be no need to see anyone’s property taxes escalate,” Scarnati said. “I have stated all along that this budget had to meet the parameters of no broad based tax increases, a budget that spends less than last year, and one that is sustainable. Those objectives were met and, at the same time, we were able to take care of our children.”

“It was a difficult process where many wonderful programs suffered some pain; however, school districts did very well,” Scarnati concluded. “One of the reasons for this increase was to ensure that school districts would not need to raise taxes on our property owners.”

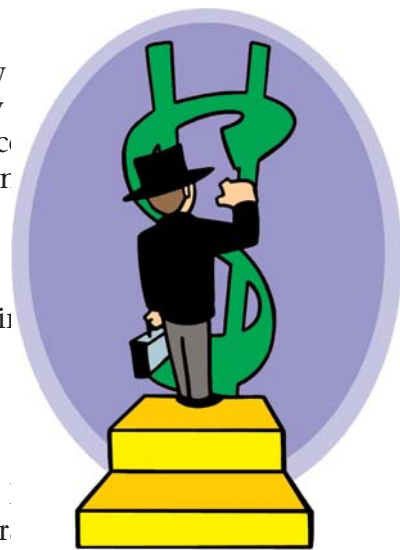
.....And they would have gotten away with it if it wasn't for us meddling kids!
